BIRTH OF THE VIP CLUB

Millie described the conception: "As I worked closely with employees getting ready to retire, I observed that many were reluctant to break the "Sperry-tie". So, in the fall of 1979, I started to plan a clubroom for our retirees. Our Plant Engineering Department was asked to draw up floor plans with cost estimates. I was allotted approximately 1,465 square feet in our Sheppard Road plant.





This plant was centrally located sort of "in the middle" of all our Twin City plant locations and was accessible by public transportation. Not only were top management supportive, but also our manufacturing management gave up prime space in a manufacturing facility.

Action on these plans started in early spring 1980. We opened a retirees club room in plant 1 as illustrated on the cover. The first general meeting was held on September 3rd, 1980, with about 75 in attendance. Officers were elected; plans were made for future monthly meetings and a set of rules were drawn up. Al Mueller was elected as the first President, and he started a newsletter to keep members informed about future activities.

Since beginning 45 years ago, the Club has had 23 Presidents; six served a single one-year term. Unfortunately, in Nov. 2023 Steve Koltes passed away just three days after being elected to a second term. The longest serving was Harvey Taipale (2018-22) as he steered us through the COVID 'pandemic'. 25 people have served as vice president, two left the board without becoming a president. We've had thirteen secretaries, eleven treasurers, and seven chief Who did what/when newsletter editors over 45 years. is on-line at www.vipclubmn.org/history.html#Leaders.

In 1984, we registered with the Internal Revenue Service as 'Sperry Retirees Club', a 501c (7) - non-profit social and services club. The VIP Club constitution states: "*The Club shall provide an opportunity for social interaction of its members*." Events are planned at board meetings on the 1st Wednesday of even numbered months.

In October 2007: In response to an application coordinated by Lowell, the IRS accepted the Board's resolution to change the VIP Club name from "Sperry Retirees Club" to "VIP CLUB". Also, the board authorized combining the Club and Legacy project's web sites onto a Microsoft hosted 'free' site, the URL, <u>http://vipclubmn.org</u> was available.

In 2025 our membership dropped below 500 after reaching a peak of 1,400 in the early 2000s. About 85 (18%) are nonagenarians, i.e. LIFE members of the VIP Club!

October 22, 2020: The club recognized founder Millie Gignac's 100th birthday with flowers, cards, and congratulations messages from members collected via Evite.

MEMBER EMERITUS

In 2008 Bernie Jansen completed his third 'term' as immediate past president. He expressed a desire to keep involved with the club, however asked what title he could have. Lowell suggested

that Member Emeritus would be appropriate – somewhat analogous to Professor Emeritus awarded to university personnel who retire. Since then, the Club Board has named several others as Member Emeritus!

December 2008, the board granted <u>Member Emeritus</u> awards to Millie Gignac, John Dufour, and Bernie Jansen for their long term service to the board and Club. Millie as the founder, John for shepherding the club through the merging of UNISYS and LMCO retirees, and Bernie for coordinating Volunteer recognition breakfasts for over a decade. Each had also actively supported the board after their office terms.





June 2009, the board granted a Member Emeritus award to Charles and Midge Homan for their long-term service to the Board and Club, specifically picnic coordination during and after Chuck's board presidency.

December 2009, the board granted a Member Emeritus award to Warren and Dorothy Becker in recognition of their decade of coordinating the annual Christmas party as well as serving on the board of directors, continuing after Warren's board presidency.

October 2010, we awarded a Member Emeritus certificate to Marion Scott in recognition of her 29 years coordinating Red Cross blood drives.

April 16, 2014, the Club granted a Member Emeritus award to Tom Turba in recognition of his creation of and continuing coordination of the Roseville Good Old Days annual event as well as his numerous years serving on the Board.

January 7, 2018, The Club granted a Member Emeritus award to Dale Phelps in recognition of his decade plus serving the board as VP, President, Past President, and Director for program planning.

February 6, 2019, the Board resolved to grant Member Emeritus status to Joseph Schwarz in recognition of his nearly 20-years as chief editor of the Club's newsletter and other board activity support.

April 17th, 2024: The club board granted Keith Behnke a member emeritus certificate recognizing his continuing support of the Club after his decade of board positions.

June 19th, 2025: The club board granted John Westergren a member emeritus certificate recognizing his decade⁺ coordinating the Club's annual picnic.

VOLUNTEER EXTRAORDINAIRE

April 16, 2015, the Club awarded the first Volunteer Extraordinaire certificate to Keith Myhre recognizing his skill and initiatives in support of the Lawshe Memorial Museum. What is this Legacy 'STUFF'? Almost 20 years ago at the October 2005 VIP Club board meeting, visiting guest Richard 'Ole' Olson asked retirees to help Lockheed Martin document the Twin Cities corporate history. We formed a small committee, then Dick Lundgren arranged a January 2006 meeting with Dr. Arthur Norberg, original director of the Charles Babbage Institute at the U of MN. Dr. Norberg retired, then Dr. Tom Misa became director of CBI and served as our advisor for 11 years. Ole retired and John Westergren became LMCO's Executive of Interest and has helped lead efforts for over a dozen years. Our volunteers have



PRELUDE

During the summer of 1945 the Navy's Op-20 organization could see an end to WWII, but wanted to continue their code breaking activities that had been housed at National Cash Register in Dayton OH since the mid 30's. About the same time, Northwest Aeronautical Corporation President John Parker started seeking what to do with the WWII glider factory and personnel as the war was ending. John Lindley's unpublished 2016 manuscript, WWII Gliders and Northwest Aeronautical Corporation (NAC) "Born of a war time necessity", has details. Lowell extracted the NAC to ERA sections from Mr. Lindley's manuscript, <u>www.vipclubmn.org/Articles/NACbecameERA.pdf</u>.



Engineering Research Associates filed MN incorporation forms 12/27/1945; then, upon approval opened for business in St. Paul on January 8, 1946.

RECOGNITIONS

AUGUST 19, 1986

Dick Lundgren wrote: "While visiting the Minnesota Historical Societies archives, I found a relevant newspaper article:

St. Paul Pioneer Press. In the 1986 index, I looked up Engineering Research Associates and found an article 8/20/86 about the 40th anniversary of ERA. Then I went to the microfilm for that



newspaper and was able to read the article which included a photo of Rolland Anderson, Bill Geiger, Jack Nichols and Bob MacDonald, and unveiling the plaque at Plant 2. It also contained the exact wording on the plaque which is: "Engineering Research Associates, the forerunner of Sperry's Minnesota presence, is the acknowledged parent of some 100 Twin Cities computer firms. In commemoration of the 40th anniversary of ERA's founding, this plaque is placed on the company's original manufacturing site this 19th day of August 1986." [rfl]




JUNE 15, 2023

On June 15th, 2023, Ramsey County Historical Society unveiled the second ERA commemoration plaque at the original ERA site. A report, <u>ERA</u> <u>History Talk</u>, discusses the history leading up to this plaque. The new plaque theme is, "*ERA and spinoffs*" *technologies came to rival agriculture and mining as a leading industry in the state.*" "*From this plant, an enormous contribution was made to human welfare throughout the world, and the*

benefits to the local economy are almost beyond measure." Don Hall, author of *Generation of Wealth - the Rise of CDC*, was the principal sponsor and emceed the program.

1985 – SPERRY CORP. 75-YR HISTORY.

In this 75th anniversary year of Sperry Corporation we are proud to join the United States Postal Service in honoring Elmer and Lawrence Sperry.

This limited-edition first day cover envelope was postmarked on the day the stamp was issued. The ceremony took place at the Cradle of Aviation Museum, which is located at the former site of Mitchel Field, in Garden Clty, Long Island. Mitchel Field was where much of the Sperrys' pioneering work in aviation took place.

Born in 1860, Elmer Sperry was a nationally known inventor by the time he founded the Sperry Gyroscope Company at Brooklyn, N.Y., in April 1910 to research practical uses for a device that, up until that time, had been little more than a child's toy-the gyroscope.

Lawrence Sperry joined his father in the business as an inventor in his own right and as test pilot. In 1911 Sperry introduced the first shipboard gyrocompass, designed to replace the magnetic compass that gave unreliable readings on the U.S. Navy's all-metal ships. From those beginnings, the Sperrys moved into the aviation industry and developed the first true flight instruments and such other "firsts" as the aircraft autopilot, turn indicator, artificial horizon, retractable landing gear, and American-designed parachute.

All of us at Sperry Corporation are honored to continue in the great tradition of our founder and his son -providing high quality, innovative solutions through technology.

Sperry's introductory ad featured in cartoon form a svelte cosmopolite sashaying her way into a soiree already well in progress. She was carrying, of course, the new Sperry PC, which drew approving and appreciative glances. The caption read something like, "It's OK to be late to the party if you bring something really good." Well, sometimes it's OK to just not go to the party. It's a long shot, but if a reader out there still has the technical data/features sheet (short form) for that Sperry PC, it would be fun to publish it here.
