

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Greetings and best wishes to you and your family! I hope your spring has been a good one and that your summer plans are taking shape. Last month I had my 80th birthday anniversary and life is still good! Yet I remind myself to live each day to the fullest as we know that death is inevitable, so it is wise to plan for it.



The VIP Club Board met recently to conduct club business. Here's a summary: We welcomed Al Douglass and Tenner Thompson to fill two open spots on the board. Next, Eric Spring was appointed club treasurer and Tenner Thompson was appointed vice president. We thank these folks for their willingness to serve. A special thanks to Harvey Taipale who contacted our former treasurer, Paul Hove, before his death and retrieved the treasurer's records, then served as our acting treasurer until Eric's appointment.

We discussed backups for various club webmaster, Evite invitations, and responsibilities: membership database. Lowell Benson is the backup webmaster. Tenner Thompson accepted the Evite backup role. We are in need of someone to fill one more open spot on the board, preferably someone with MS Excel experience to be the membership database backup! The financial situation of the club continues to be the biggest concern of the board. Our membership continues to decline. Eighty-five members did not renew in 2025 which leaves us with only 471 paying members; once members reach age 90, they are Life members and pay no dues. So, income will continue to decrease. With our current dues policy, income is less than \$3,000 per year which does not cover our annual expenses. We therefore must use our dwindling reserves to cover the difference. This can't continue for long.

The board decided to discontinue the annual April Volunteer Recognition Luncheon at Joseph's Grill due to decreasing attendance and the rising cost of hosting it. We anticipate that members' volunteer efforts will nevertheless continue without the event.

Planning continues for the eventual closing of the VIP Club. Being considered:

- Decide what information we want to keep longterm
- Determine our bottom-line financial situation
- ♦ Choose what to do with the website once we close
- Plan a final closing event to devote the last of the cash to club members.

We give thanks to a club member who made a generous contribution with his last renewal that will cover his dues well past his 90th birthday, and who therefore has been made a Life member. What a great thing to do!! We encourage each of you to consider a contribution to the club as your finances permit to help keep the club going longer.

Another bright moment occurred at the Annual Reunion Picnic where John Westergren was awarded the status of "Member Emeritus" for his years of service leading and supporting our Legacy Committee initiatives, including facilitating transfers of thousands of artifacts, photos, and documents to the Lawshe Memorial Museum and the Charles Babbage Institute; coordinating receipt of artifacts from Clearwater, FL and documents from Iron Mountain; hosting LMCO open houses; video recording ERA Old Timers (Interviews, Chapter 22, Section 4), also referred to as the Original Geek Squad; PLUS serving as a VIP Club Board director AND years serving as our picnic coordinator and host. Be sure to thank him the next time you see him!

I unfortunately received a resignation letter from long-time board member Dick Lundgren, whose health problems have kept him from active participation on the board. In 2016, in recognition of his decade writing articles for the Legacy Committee, supporting the VIP Club's event planning, and serving on the Syttende Mai planning committee, Dick became a "Volunteer Extraordinaire." He will continue to participate in club activities when possible. We thank him for his loyalty and involvement on the board and wish him well.

YOUR STORY

As mentioned in the president's letter, we have new VIP Club board members! Tenner is sharing his personal story here. Your Stories are always welcome!

Tenner Thompson

In 1976 I finished high school in Williston, ND, then I was off to Concordia College to get a degree in computer science with math as a backup plan. The problem was that



Concordia didn't have a computer science major. By taking classes at North Dakota State University (NDSU) & Minnesota State University Moorhead, I received enough credits to be the first person to graduate from Concordia College with a computer science BA, and

threw in a math major and chemistry minor.

In 1980, Sperry UNIVAC gave me a job offer—not as much as Texas Instruments, but I didn't have to move to Texas! I started my career in Paul Wood's group working on a debugger for the OS16 16-bit operating system which was used on the UYK-20. That transitioned into the UYK-44 executive tool suite. My team then designed and built a Relational Database Management System (RDBMS) for the UYK-43. That project sent me to Japan twice to deliver and teach a 43RDBMS class. Later I did Independent Research and Development (IR&D) work on the Portable Operating System Interface (POSIX) operating system. After that I moved to Pam Johnson's Tools and Process group. One tool I supported was a management tool for Configuration Management (CM) called Project Configuration Management System (PCMS). That kept me busy for years. While supporting PCMS I learned a whole lot about CM. When Lockheed Martin announced the closing of the Eagan location and people started leaving the building, I wore two hats, tools and CM, for most projects still in Eagan.

After the Lockheed Martin Eagan location closed, my next stop was a CM position at Thomson Reuters which lasted for six years until a major reorganization showed me the door. Fortunately, Product Development Associates (PDA) Engineering under Tony Pascuzzi had a need for a tools guy. That allowed me to complete my 42-year computer engineering career working with several ex-Lockheed Martin people. I officially retired in May 2023.

Now I have time to volunteer on the VIP Club Tenner Thompson board!



In 2007, Harvey Taipale wrote: "This story, particularly the early years, has never really been completely told; e.g., ATHENA launching missiles. To be sure, there are accounts written from the business history perspective, from various customer and user perspectives, and partial documentation in many places. However, we are unaware of any account that properly gives credit to the ingenuity, vision, and hard work of ERA and its successor company employees, and their contributions to Minnesota and the world."

A dozen magazine articles (<u>vipclubmn.org/OurStorie s.html#Magazines</u>) and a dozen unpublished papers (<u>vipc lubmn.org/OurStories.html#unpub</u>) have also told bits of the story; <u>vipclubmn.org/OurStories.html#Books</u> lists 25 books, each of which tells bytes of the story.

SO, the sum of these, our 60-chapter anthology, 210 career summaries, and 220⁺ monthly stories, DO TELL THE STORY. Highlights of our two-decade quest are:

- 1. The TPT documentary <u>Solid State: Minnesota's High-Tech History</u> based on Tom Misa's book <u>Digital State</u>. Of the 20 interviewees featured in the documentary, 8 were VIP Club and Legacy Committee members. The filming included shots from the Lawshe Memorial Museum and the VIP Club's 2019 Annual Reunion Picnic in Eagan. The narrator was Tom Misa, who was our legacy advisor for 11 years.
- 2. A permanent hardware artifact and history poster exhibit at the Dakota County Historical Society (DCHS) Lawshe Memorial Museum in South St. Paul (vipclubmn.o rg/Articles/RealizationofaDream.pdf). Keith Myhre, Les Nelson, Bob Pagac, and Jon Simon are stalwart volunteers there.
- 3. Unpublished documents that showed loose patent agreements had an IBM working office at ERA in the early 1950s. In 1952, ERA delivered a paper computer design to IBM based on drum memory technology. In 1953, IBM announced their Model 650 computer using drum memory. So, ERA helped today's most successful computer company get going.
- 4. Preservation of the commercial computer technology display shadowboxes from 1953 (UNIVAC 1103) to 1996 (IX5800) (vipclubmn.org/Articles/ThroughTheAges.pdf).
- 5. Participation in the unveiling of an ERA commemoration plaque on June 15, 2023, at the original ERA St. Paul facility (vipclubmn.org/Articles/ERA History Talk.pdf).
- 6. Placement at the 2008 MN sesquicentennial of ERA history data into the time capsule for opening at the 2058 bicentennial. We also had a legacy display at the state capitol grounds and a booth at the MN State Fair (vipclub mn.org/Articles/It'sAWrap.pdf).


Robert "Bob" Charles Hanson — Age 92, of Arden Hills, MN passed away peacefully June 1,

After Atron was acquired by Mohawk Data Sciences, Dennis briefly worked for the merged company before returning to Minnesota to join Twin City Die Casting, and eventually rejoining Sperry UNIVAC/Unisys, from which he retired. Dennis enjoyed keeping up with local affairs and serving on the Lake Minnetonka Cable Commission for many years. He was always happy to discuss the latest issues, read the newspaper from cover to cover, and was a longsuffering yet avid Vikings fan. Dennis was the family's unofficial historian, keeping records for the family genealogy. In retirement, Dennis spent many winters in Hawaii and Arizona with Nancy, enjoying the local scenery and culture. 
